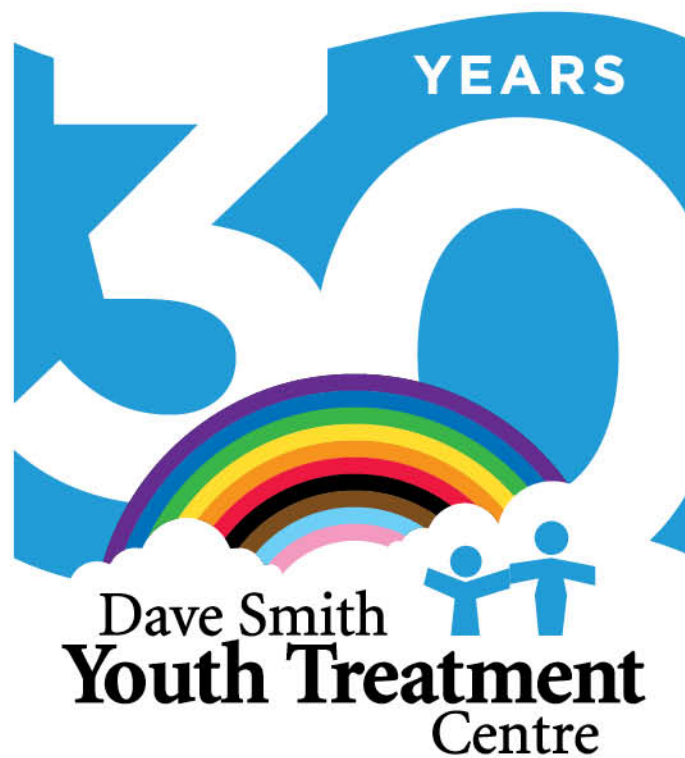

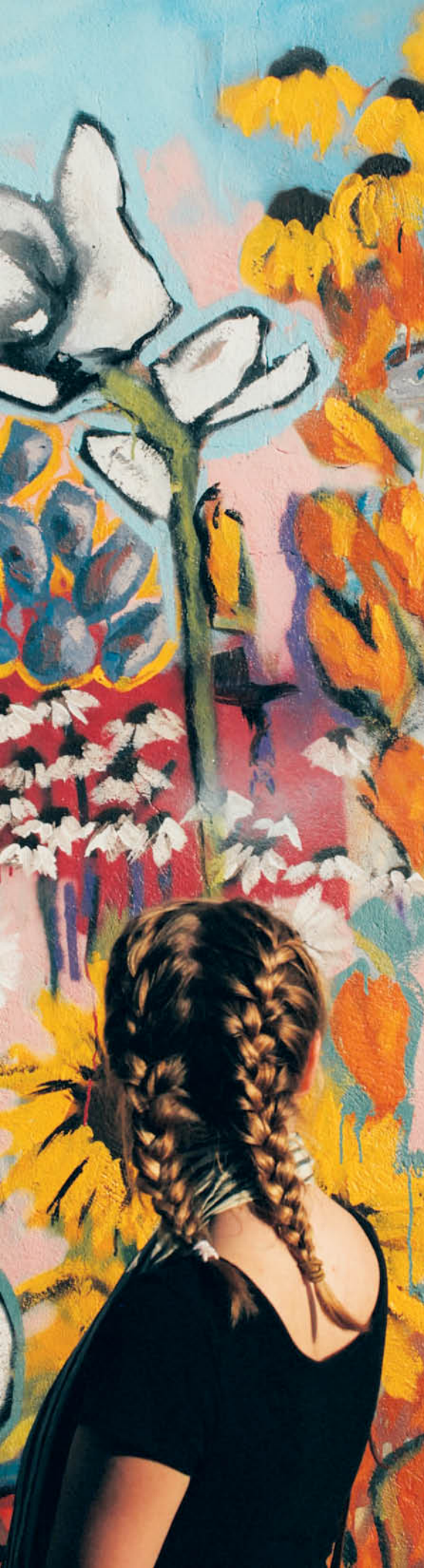


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A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

DSYTC programs and services include: comprehensive assessment, 24-bed live-in treatment, academic programming, pro-social recreation, psychiatric support, nurse practitioner primary care, post treatment continuing care and family services.

The DSYTC team is comprised of diverse, multidisciplinary professionals who conduct themselves with tremendous integrity, care, enthusiasm and expertise. Clinical team members include Addiction Therapists, Addiction and Continuing Care Counsellors, Overnight Support and a Family Therapist. These individuals work closely with our committed management and administrative staff as well as our service provision partners, including: teachers, nurse practitioners and a consulting psychiatrist. The impressive and inspirational efforts and outcomes of our clients are further supported by our invaluable volunteers, student placements and our incredibly dedicated Board of Directors.

Our team is our organization's most valuable asset and we are privileged to not only help our clients achieve their goals, but to work closely with partners across the region and province to help ensure timely, accessible, coordinated and effective mental health and addiction services for all who want and need it. We are particularly proud of our involvement with Addictions and Mental Health Ontario (AMHO) and the Kids Come First Ontario Health Team (OHT), whose efforts have and will continue to positively transform the health sector response for children, youth and families in our community.

STAFF EXPERIENCE SURVEY RESULTS

One DSYTC Team Member's Story

Growing up in Thunder Bay, I wasn't quite sure about my future career. Although Thunder Bay has produced many notable NHL players, I recognized at a young age that going to the NHL was more than a long shot for me (after all, there can only be so many Staals). It wasn't until my final year of high school that I began taking my future seriously and developed an interest in psychology.

Working with youth in a treatment setting demanded patience, compassion, and the ability to build trust."

As I approached the end of graduate school, I had the opportunity to undertake a clinical psychology internship in Ottawa. This experience became a turning point for me. Working directly with clients during the internship made me realize my preference for one-on-one interaction with clients in a team environment.

Following the internship, I chose to remain in Ottawa and was hired as an addiction counsellor at the Dave Smith Youth Treatment Centre. Working with youth in a treatment setting demanded patience, compassion, and the ability to build trust. It also involved dealing with intense and sometimes chaotic situations. Despite these challenges, I found the field to be incredibly stimulating and rewarding.

When I was hired at the Centre, I don't think I fully appreciated the impact both Dave Smith and the Centre had made on the community. However, as I was regularly approached by individuals expressing their gratitude to both, it was clear that the type of work we do here is greatly valued.

Having now worked with the agency for over 12 years (seven years as an addiction therapist/registered psychotherapist), I've had the privilege to experience some amazing successes in what can often be a very difficult field. Working with youth and families, I can now say I understand the positive impact that the Dave Smith Youth Treatment Centre has made throughout Ontario. I was lucky enough to meet Dave while he was still with us, and I know he'd be proud of every youth who makes it through our doors. Though I may not be in the NHL, I can definitely say this path gives me a sense of joy and accomplishment on a regular basis.



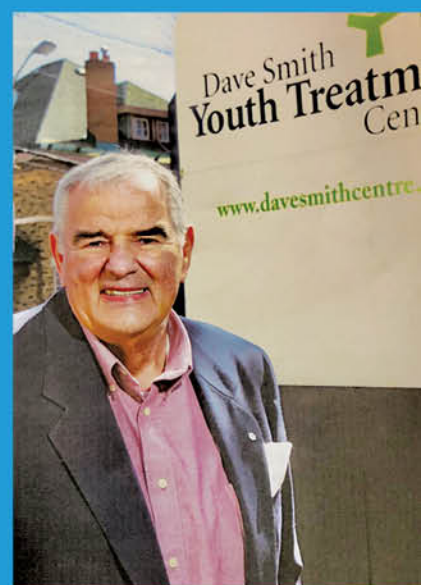
Our founder **DAVE SMITH**

One of Dave Smith's proudest achievements was the establishment in the early 1990s of his addiction treatment centre dedicated to helping young people - the Dave Smith Youth Treatment Centre.

After receiving a frantic call from a close friend whose son was addicted to drugs, Dave became frustrated that no intensive treatment facility existed in Ottawa for youth struggling with drug and alcohol issues. As usual, Dave took action where he saw a need in his beloved community. After several years of advocacy, fundraising, door-knocking, speeches and dogged persistence, the Dave Smith Youth Treatment Centre received operational funding from the Province of Ontario and opened its doors on Bronson Avenue in 1993. To date, it has supported more than 18,000 youth and family members with life-saving addiction and mental health treatment and counselling services.

Dave's wife, Darlene, says it best: "David loved people. He loved helping people. Gifted with a servant's heart, his good works are everywhere in the city. And as much as he accomplished - he always felt there was so much left to do."

At the top of that "to do" list was the construction of a new treatment facility to better serve the vulnerable young people who continue to reach out for help from the Dave Smith Youth Treatment Centre. He championed a grand vision to bring together the three existing sites into one purpose-built complex that would expand the number of available beds, reduce wait times, and bring all of the dedicated Addiction Counsellors and healthcare professionals under one roof.



Our Clients



DSYTC clientele consist of youth (aged 13-21) and caregivers who reside in Ottawa or in other areas of the province of Ontario. These individuals want and need evidence-based treatment and support as they cope with the challenges and complexities that exist with addiction, substance use and related mental health issues.

AGE AND GENDER

- 28% of clients are 13-17
- 72% of clients are 18-21
- 46% identify as male and 50% identify as female
- 2% identify as non-binary
- 2% identify as transgender

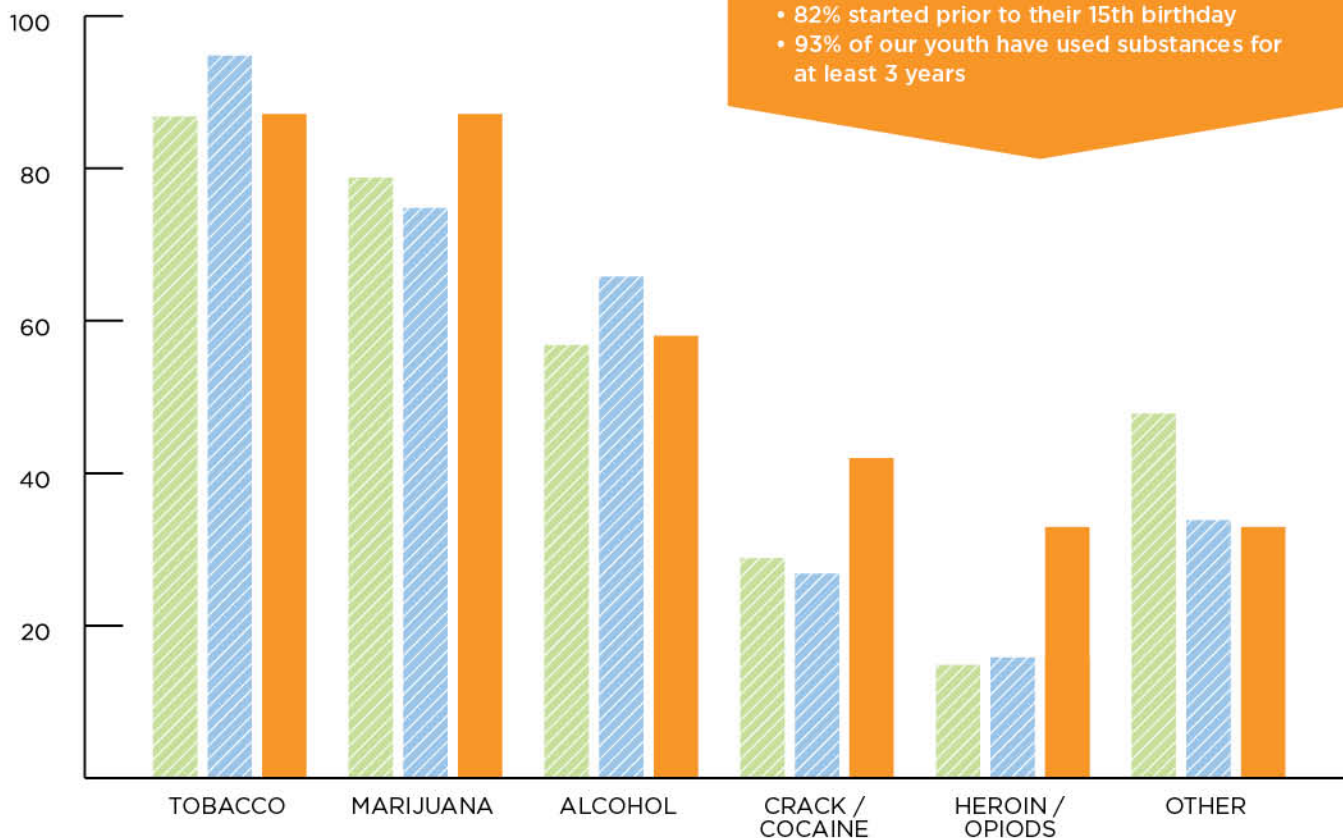
REFERRAL SOURCE

- 49% of our clients self-referred
- 51% were referred by family members or other service providers

SUBSTANCE USE

The majority of our youth use multiple substances and most use substances daily:

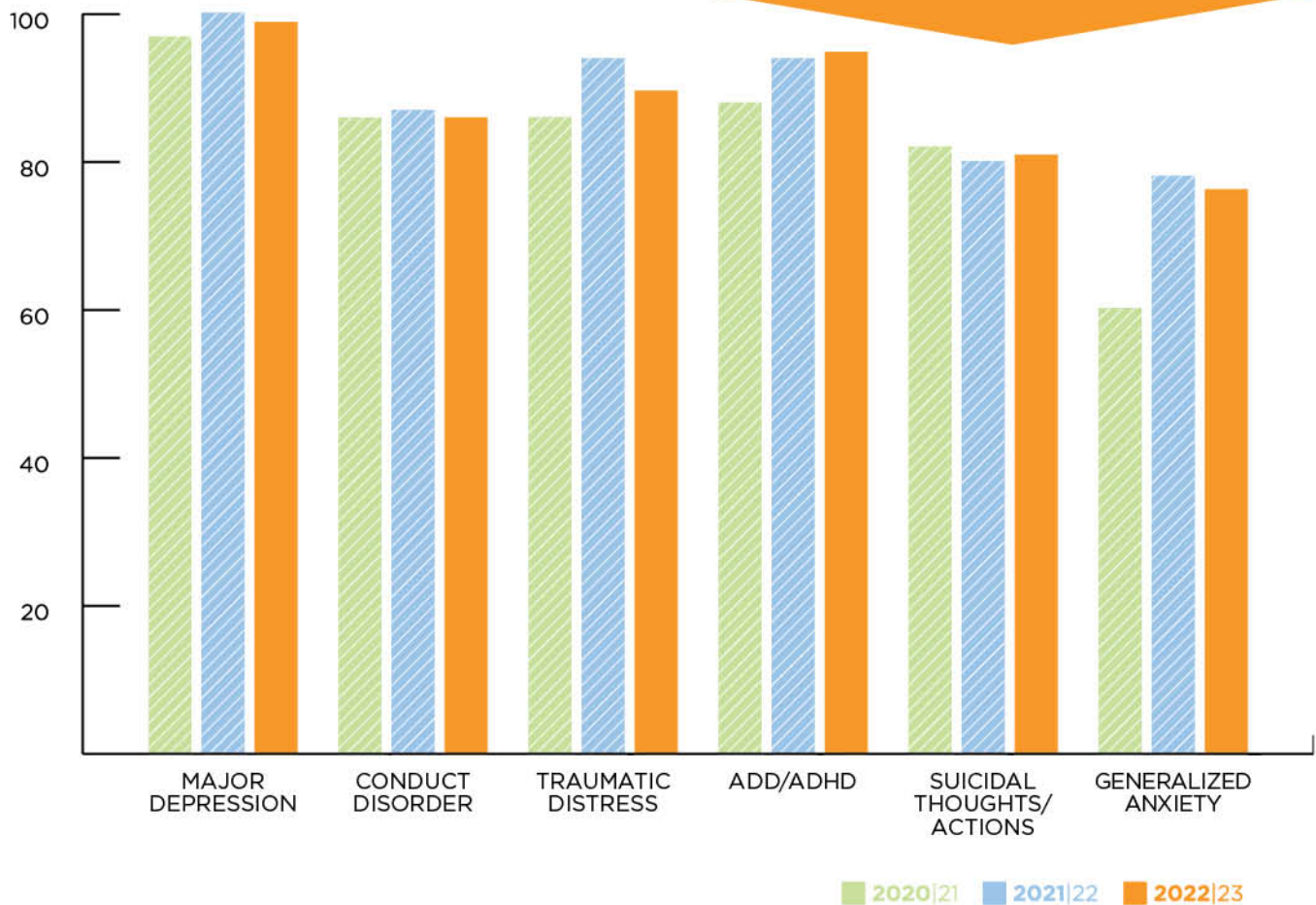
- 100% of our youth commenced using substances prior to the age of 18
- 82% started prior to their 15th birthday
- 93% of our youth have used substances for at least 3 years

MENTAL HEALTH

- 100% of our clients struggle with multiple concurrent disorders



When I first got here, I thought I was beyond help. My brain is too messed up from substance use, I told my Therapist. I'm never going to be able to get better. In my heart of hearts, I truly believed that. I believed I was too old and used too many substances to ever truly recover and feel some semblance of normalcy and satisfaction with my life... after 3 months in treatment with the negative voice is a whisper now, I realize I am capable of changing. I am capable of living a satisfactory existence without substances. I made it, and let me tell you it was worth it.

It was the third time I overdosed. I was in the hospital when I truly realized that I was not in a good place and I needed help. I had to come to the realization that I could not do it alone and I needed someone to help me pick myself up. I was using pills to numb myself and not have to deal with my life experiences and emotions, I didn't even realize why I was using. With time in treatment being sober and thinking rationally I realized how much of a problem I really had. Deep down I knew I needed to fix that first before I could do anything else.

The Dave Smith Treatment Centre has truly saved my life. They taught me how to live a healthy lifestyle, how to get through tough times, and all the skills I could ever need to cope with what is happening deep down. You will do the same you just have to put in the work and they will guide you through the rest. When I first got here I wanted to leave so badly but for some reason near the end I did not want to leave because this is one of the only places in the world where you are truly safe and not only safe from substances and behaviors but from yourself. I am truly having a hard time knowing that I will never see the staff and other workers again but nonetheless I am truly ready for the outside world.

If you are having a tough time, remember why you started and the first 1 to 2 weeks here are the hardest but eventually it starts flying by so fast it's scary, trust me. I am truly a totally different person because of this place in a good way and I couldn't do anything to repay this place.

I am going to continue to try and become an electrician, and get a steady income so I can focus on being a professional boxer. And this place has helped me do that. All you have to do is keep your chin up and focus on yourself.

Our Program

In addition to our collective efforts to move beyond the difficult realities of the COVID-19 pandemic, we commenced construction on a new, 30-bed live-in treatment facility. This modern 'home away from home' will increase our treatment capacity by 25% and reduce wait times for life-saving treatment. Despite some delays, construction has proceeded very well and we are extremely grateful for the immense efforts of all involved in this incredibly important project for youth and families across Ontario. We eagerly anticipate formally opening the doors to our new Centre in early 2024.

The DSYTC also celebrates its 30-year anniversary in 2023! This milestone brings with it a timely opportunity to reflect on the tens of thousands of people who have come through our doors, seeking and finding help and support along the way. We also take time to warmly consider all the staff and volunteers who have helped the Centre grow and evolve over the past three decades into an invaluable resource in our community. As we reflect on our past, we also remain steadfast in supporting those in the present, and planning as best as possible for what the future will hold. While the need for addiction and mental health services remain great, we along with our dedicated partners will continue to be here to provide the best possible evidence-based care for those who need it.

As part of current and future planning efforts, we continue to advocate for a comprehensive Health Human Resources strategy that will see sustained and

LIVE-IN PROGRAM

The DSYTC operates two, 24-hour live-in addiction treatment facilities for youth. Carp Campus is a 10-bed facility for females; Carleton Place Campus is a 14-bed facility for males. Within these separate campuses, we offer gender-specialized programming to address the complex and unique needs of each individual we serve. Trans and gender diverse youth are supported at either live-in campus and specific treatment location placement is determined in consultation between the youth and DSYTC staff.

Within a client-centered approach, we provide evidence-based and informed interventions and everything we do is subject to continuous quality improvement.

Our clinical approaches include:

- Adolescent Community Reinforcement Approach (ACRA)
- Assertive Continuing Care (ACC)
- Community Reinforcement and Family Training (CRAFT)
- Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT)
- Motivational Interviewing (MI)
- Seeking Safety (Trauma)
- Collaborative Problem Solving (CPS)
- Dialectical Behavioural Therapy (DBT)

Experiencing healthy, pro-social, therapeutic recreation activities (eg. sports, art, etc.) in a non-using environment is a critically important and enjoyable aspect of DSYTC programming.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The majority of young people who struggle with substance use have fallen behind in their academic pursuits, been expelled and/or have dropped out of school. This past year **50%** of our clients were not in school prior to entering treatment. Given the relationship between academic achievement and

longer-term success in areas of self-confidence and self-efficacy, academic programming is an invaluable part of the DSYTC offering. Clients at the residences receive individualized programming and are able to earn high school credits through our partnership with the M.F. McHugh Education Centre. Support for College, University and other academic pursuits is also available.

In the 2022/2023 academic year, 64 clients attended academic classes while in treatment.

Together they achieved:

- 104 credits
- 112 student volunteer hours
- 2 High School graduations

DSYTC's commitment to continuing education was further demonstrated by awarding scholarships to clients who demonstrated noteworthy progress and a desire to further their academic studies after leaving residential treatment.

SUPPORT SERVICES

PSYCHIATRY

In partnership with a local psychiatrist, psychiatric support and consultation is available to help address the varied and complex mental health needs of the youth we serve.

- 72 clients received a total of 216 hours of psychiatric services

PRIMARY CARE

In partnership with two community health centres, nurse practitioners are available to support the physical and related health needs of youth clients every week.

- Nurse practitioners conducted 331 health-based appointments with 64 clients

Both staff and clients worked very hard (and in very hot weather) for 2 months with other community members at the Blakeney Gardens. Our clients were introduced to new skills, provided education on gardening and how to create their own food source and were able to put valuable work/volunteer experience on their resumes. Staff were absolutely instrumental in getting clients on board with this pro-social over the summer! It's not an easy task to get clients up early on the weekend and excited about doing hard, dirty work!



FAMILY SERVICES

We understand that substance use has a significant impact on everyone in the family, and we recognize that caregiver involvement is a critically important part of our treatment process. Family Services are available to caregivers of youth who are currently participating in treatment in the live-in and continuing care programs at the DSYTC. Perhaps not surprisingly, extensive research and our own experience clearly demonstrate that meaningful caregiver involvement in the treatment process leads to the best possible outcomes for youth and families.

Our Family Services include:

- Individual and family counselling
- Education and guidance based on the CRAFT (Community Reinforcement and Family Training) model
- Ongoing communication, consultation and crisis support
- Referrals to local resources as needed

We served 148 caregivers and family members from all across Ontario in 2022-2023.

- 63% of caregivers and family members completed a Family Service Program.
- 97% of youth clients report feeling their family relationships have improved since arriving at DSYTC.

ASSERTIVE CONTINUING CARE PROGRAM

In order to support healthy lifestyle change, reduce relapse risk and to facilitate community linkage, After-care counsellors assertively engage youth and families immediately after the live-in phase has ended. Clients, both youth and family members, are provided 3 months of individual counselling and support in their community including securing safe housing, continuing education, job searches, and many other social services.

Our son was a reluctant participant at DSYTC, but we noticed immediately that he had structure in his life – good sleep, hygiene, food, physical activity. He was getting his medication. He was getting counselling. The son we knew before seemed to be returning. And for the first time, while our son was in DSYTC and for three months afterwards, we, as parents, received support, education, and counselling, thanks to regular meetings with our Family Therapist... when I look back on our journey of the last few years, I can see that the support our family got from the DSYTC was a turning point for our son, and for us.

Today, we are proud of how well he is doing in managing his mental health. He has a new job. He hopes to return to finish his university studies one day. He still struggles, as do we, with his cannabis use, but his situation is stable, and our relationship with him is much improved, as is his relationship with his brother.

I know my son and our family would be in a very different place today were it not for the help we received through the DSYTC.

Year In Review

OCCUPANCY RATES AND WAIT TIMES

- 82 youth & 148 family members received services
- Occupancy rate for males was 91% and females 88%, overall 84%
- Wait times ranged from 20 to 45 days – average wait time of 40 days

To provide a safe environment for clients and staff, and as a result of the Pandemic, our live-in campuses operated at reduced capacity for the 2022/23 period. We hope to return to full capacity at some point in 2023/24.

PROGRAM COMPLETION RATES

- The average length of stay was 66 days
- 60% completed the entire live-in program
- 89% completed 14 days or more in treatment
- 29% self-discharged prior to 3-months (partially completed after varying lengths of stay)
- 8% were administratively discharged prior to 3 months
- 2% were medically discharged prior to program completion

PANDEMIC RESPONSE AND IMPACT

The safety and well-being of our clients and team members remains our ultimate priority, and we are incredibly proud of how the DSYTC team responded throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.

While some risk mitigation measures have remained in place, 2023/2024 will see the DSYTC eliminate any unjustified pandemic protocols as well as return to full bed capacity. We will also continue to consult with public health experts, government officials and sector colleagues in the context of ongoing health and safety. Moving forward, our new facility design and related protocols will offer tremendous benefits as it relates to infection, prevention and control.

Lastly, we at the DSYTC and its partners will continue to advocate for significant sector investment and strategic supports so to help us combat the addiction and mental health crisis which was exacerbated by the pandemic.

CLIENT PROGRESS REPORT

Client progress during treatment

- 96% reported feeling safe while in treatment
- 90% were satisfied or highly satisfied with quality of treatment
- 100% would recommend DSYTC to a friend in need

Our clients reported improvements in the following aspects of their lives:

- 91% reported meeting substance use goals
- 89% reported improved physical health
- 82% reported improved family relationships

POST TREATMENT REPORT

Six months after arriving at DSYTC, 87% of clients reported an increase in overall life satisfaction which is reflected in the following areas:

- 72% fewer days of illegal activity
- 63% less arguing and violence
- 56% less substance use
- 50% less externalizing mental health problems
- 31% less internalizing mental health problems
- 52% less high risk behaviour

Concept Drawing of the new DSYTC Facility



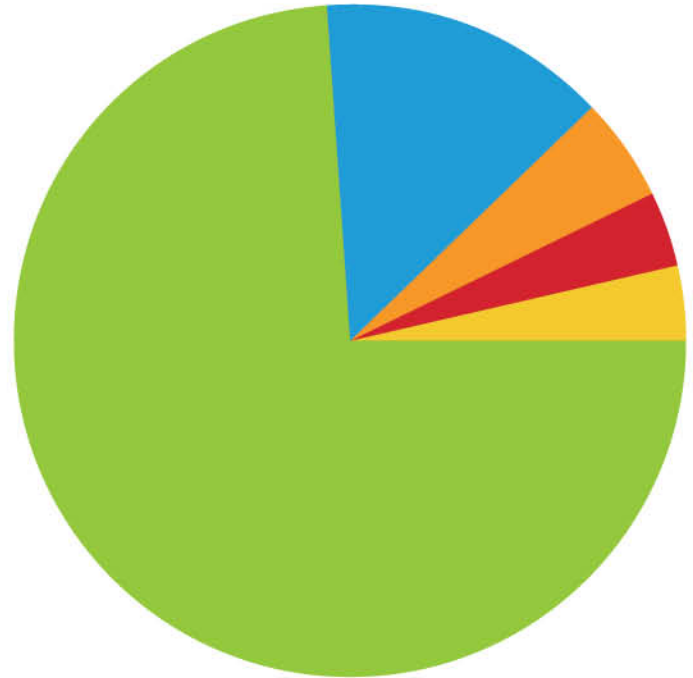

\$93,911 EXPENDITURES OVER REVENUE

Figures presented are in line with the audited annual financial statements which follow the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Under this method, donations received and restricted to the capital campaign are deferred and amortized to revenues on the same basis as the new facility is amortized to expenses. Current year deficit was covered by previous surplus in the unrestricted donations fund.
